### MEMBERSHIP TO STUDENTS

The Board of Directors of our Society passed a resolution at its summer meeting granting a one-year membership to all high school and college students who receive an award for scholastic achievement in the study of the German language at our annual awards presentation in May. This will entitle the students to receive copies of our newsletter and notices of our events. It is hoped that these contacts with the Society may encourage the students to continue their relationship with us. The motion for the resolution was made by Thomas Werner and seconded by Dr. Armin Mruck.

### BUERGERVEREIN DELEGATES

Each organization which is a member of the Deutschamerikanischer Bürgerverein von Maryland has representation based upon the number of its members. The German Society is represented by its president, three delegates and alternates. Our

delegates are: Merl E. Arp, Paul-Gerhard Otto and Dr. James D. Schaub. Theodore J. Potthast is an alternate. The Bürgerverein meets on the last Friday of the month at 7:45 p.m. at the clubhouse of the Baltimore Kickers on South Broadway. ### GERMAN HERITAGE FOUNDATION

The German American museum which opened in Washington, DC in March is soliciting funds to maintain its operations. Our Board of Directors approved a gift of \$100 to the Foundation which operates the museum.

### GERMAN AT NAVAL ACADEMY

Add Navy to the list of Maryland colleges in which German is taught. We learned this from one of our members, Shirley Santora, a German teacher at Arundel Community College, who received a request to help out by tutoring a midshipman. She couldn't do it herself, due to time restraints, but was seeking a tutor for the middie. We were pleased to learn that the Academy conducts German courses.

### WWI FINALLY OVER

On Oct. 3, 2010 Germany made its final payment to the United States as reparations agreed upon in the armistice of Nov. 11, 1918, By coincidence, Sgt. Henry Gunther of Baltimore had closure to the story of his death on Nov. 11, 1918 in a ceremony initiated by our Society dedicating a monument to him at his grave in Baltimore. The terms of the armistice placed such a harsh burden on Germany that an American statesman predicted the terms were a guarantee of another war. The prediction was accurate: WWII broke out 20 years afterward.

# HELP MAKE OCTOBER GERMAN AMERICAN MONTH IN MD

Susan Aumann and Bill Frank, two members of our Society who have just been reelected to the Maryland House of Delegates, have pre-filed a bill to make October German American month in Maryland. It won't happen unless the bill is passed by the legislature. That's where we come in. Susan and Bill need other legislators to sign on when the bill is introduced; and they need a large contingent to show up in Annapolis for the hearing once a hearing date is set.

Shelley Arnold, a member of our Board of Directors, is savvy on the workings of Maryland's General Assembly and will lead our efforts to get a large turnout for the hearing. She will keep us posted on the timing and the location of the hearing room. This will likely occur in February. Shelley tells us that the more co-sponsors of the bill and a large turnout at the hearing is essential to assure passage of the bill. So please gear up to call your representatives in Annapolis to ask them to co-sponsor the bill; and stay loose so you'll be available to go to Annapolis for the hearing.

Our Society is considering getting one or more buses to take us to Annapolis. We are also expecting that the other members of the Bürgerverein will also support these efforts. As soon as we have the details, we will send out a flier with information on what to do to assure that German Americans in MD have equal rights with the other groups which have months set aside for them, such as February for "Black History Month" (requiring special classes in public schools), Irish American month, etc.

### GEARING UP FOR 200TH ANNIVERSARY CELEBRATION OF WAR OF 1812

The United States Mint is planning to issue a \$5 gold piece and a \$1 silver piece in early 2012 to kick off the national celebration of the War of 1812, our nation's second war of independence. The State of Maryland is also planning the biggest celebration in its history, since it was the Marylanders who defeated the British in 1814 and sent them packing back to England. The German Society of Maryland had many members who fought at Fort McHenry and at North Point and withstood the British army at Patterson Park. Our

own member, General John Stricker received the title "The Hero of the Battle of North Point". Our Society is forming a committee to publicize the role of German Americans in the War of 1812. We are looking for some charter members for the committee. Our own lifetime director, Dandridge Brooke, served as national president of The Society of the War of 1812 and will hold a leadership role in our Society's commemoration. Brig. General Hall Worthington, the military successor to Gen. John Stricker, will serve as the chairman of the committee.

# FULL HOUSE FOR ECUMENICAL SERVICE

## German-American Day, 2010

By the President of the United States of America

#### A Proclamation

The American story has been written by those who have come to our shores in search of freedom, opportunity, and the chance at a better life. The German men and women who braved numerous perils to cross the Atlantic long ago left a legacy of millions of Americans of German ancestry who have been an integral part of our national life. On German-American Day, we pay tribute to the role this community has played in shaping America and contributing to our progress and prosperity.

On October 6, 1683, 13 courageous German families arrived in Pennsylvania to start a new life. They began a chapter in the American narrative that has influenced our country in all walks of life, and their resolve lives on in the men, women, and families of German descent who enhance civic engagement, steer our industries, and fortify our Nation's character. With their dedication and determination, the United States has been a leader in ingenuity and entrepreneurship, and has delivered a message of hope and opportunity that resonates around the world. Today, German Americans innovate and excel as leaders in all sectors of our society.

On this occasion, we honor not only the countless achievements and rich heritage of German Americans, but also the strong ties between Germany and the United States. Our two nations share unbreakable bonds as allies with solemn obligations to one another's security; values that inspired those brave settlers four centuries ago; and a vision for a safer, freer, more peaceful, more prosperous world.

NOW, THEREFORE, I, BARACK OBAMA, President of the United States of America, by virtue of the authority vested in me by the Constitution and the laws of the United States, do hereby proclaim October 6, 2010, as German-American Day. I encourage all Americans to learn more about the history of German Americans and reflect on the many contributions they have made to our Nation.

IN WITNESS WHEREOF, I have hereunto set my hand this sixth day of October, in the year of our Lord two thousand ten, and of the Independence of the United States of America the two hundred and thirty-fifth.

### FREDERICK L. RIEDEL, 82

Our Society and the German American Community has lost a special friend. Fred Riedel, a member of our Board of Directors, died October 4th at the age of 82 years after a long struggle with heart disease.

Fred was born on June 23, 1928 and raised in South Baltimore of immigrant German grandparents. He and his wife, Louise visited his relatives in Germany several times. Fred's father was a fireman and died when Fred was 5. Since his youth, Fred wanted to be a fireman like his father. So for 44 years he served in the Baltimore County Fire Dept. retiring as Captain in 1997. For 11 years Fred served in the Marine Reserves. In 1952 Fred was drafted into the Army serving from 1952 to 1954 in the Korean War. In his later years in the Fire Dept., Fred developed and implemented Fire Prevention programs and was always happy to recount his fireman exploits.

In 1961, Fred married Louise, whom we have known as an inseparable couple for 49 years. They met at the Alcazar where they often danced during their courtship. Their 50th anniversary would have been next year. Fred was already planning the celebration when he died. He is survived by Louise; their son, Frederick L. Riedel III, and 3 grandchildren. Fred the 3rd is a Lieutenant in the Anne Arundel County Fire Dept. which follows the long family tradition of service to the community.

After retiring, Fred became a park ranger at Ft. McHenry for 10 years. He was active in many other German organizations and clubs: at his death he was president of Club Fidelitas, Inc.; Deutschamerikanischer Bürgerverein von MD; Club Geselligkeit; Germania Lodge & Composit Lodge of the Ancient & Accepted Order of Masons. Other organizations to which Fred belonged are the Boumi Temple Shrine; the Tall Cedars; the Scottish Rite; the St. George's Society; The Society for the War of 1812; the American Legion, the Veterans of Foreign Wars & the Korean War Veterans Assn. He was a communicant of St. Andrew's Lutheran Church. He was buried at Dulaney Valley Memorial Gardens in a service in which our president, The Rev. Siegfried Otto participated. He received full military honors. The German Society and his many friends will miss him, especially his jokes, which he never seemed to lack and enjoyed telling. God speed Fred and thank you for your time with us.

### MENCKEN STAINED GLASS WINDOW IN IN LEIPZIG, GERMANY RESTORED


We learn from the newsletter of The Mencken Society that the stained glass window memorializing the family of our former member, Henry L. Mencken has been restored and is ready to be re-installed in its original place of honor in the Thomaskirche in the university town of Leipzig. H. L. Mencken saw it while visiting Leipzig in 1922. His family members served on the faculty of the university: Otto Mencke(n) (1674-1707), Lueder Mencke (1658-1726; Johann Burckhard Mencke (1674-1732) and Friedrich Otto Mencke (1708-1754). The St. Thomas Church dates back to the 12th century and is the final resting place of Johann Sebastian Bach. The impetus for the restoration of the window was the work of Dieter Spielberg, a member of the German Mencken Society. Martin Luther preached from the pulpit of Thomaskirche in 1539. Our member, H. L. Mencken was proud of his German ancestry and especially of his relatives on the university faculty, even though Mencken himself never attended college.

### PASTOR ROGGELIN'S FIRST PUBLIC APPEARANCE AS A U. S. CITIZEN



The Rev. Dr. Holger Roggelin, a member of our Society, spoke at the ceremony for the dedication of the Sgt. Henry Gunther plaque on Nov. 11th and announced that this day was his first full day as an American citizen. He and his wife had been naturalized the day before. All present applauded.

### WAGNER, MULLER IN THE NEWS

A new member of our Society, Sister Virginia Muller, found herself unexpectedly featured on national TV As trustee of a trust set up by another member, Ted Potthast, she became the owner of a rare 1906 baseball card of shortstop Honus Wagner.



Tom Callahan came into the card in 1936 when he was a youngster, preserved it and on his death gave

it to The School Sisters of Notre Dame (an order of nuns founded in Germany). Once Sister Virginia sent it to the auction house, sports writers all over the USA wanted a piece of the story. She appeared on national TV, ESPN sports network and spread the word that the proceeds of the sale will be used by the School Sisters to benefit the poor and for education in the U.S. and in the sisters' world-wide missions. Although the card is damaged, it still brought \$279,000 at auction. A mint condition card of Wagner was recently sold by Wayne Gretzky (a famous hockey star) for \$2.3 million dollars.

### REV. ALLEN NOVOTNY, S.J., 58

German teacher, school president

Father Allen Novotny, a Baltimore native, died in his room at Gonzaga College High School in Washington, D.C. while serving as the school's president. He attended Sacred Heart school in Highlandtown and graduated from Loyola Blakefield in Towson, where he taught prior to his ordination. Afterward he returned as rector of the Jesuit community, dean of students and teacher of German. He had studied in Heidelberg, Germany as a Fullbright scholar. An athlete, he would often disappear from the president's office and spend an afternoon bicycling on Washington's Mall. He previously served as a chaplain at Loyola Univ. He exhibited flu symptoms on a Monday and died on Wednesday, Oct. 27. As a fundraiser, he was able to build a 20 million dollar addition to Gonzaga in a year and a half.

## "SUMMIT" ON THE FUTURE OF TEACHING GERMAN IN OUR AREA (MD, VA and DC)

German courses in our area are on the decline. School administrators are claiming that German is no longer "relevant." One of our directors, a high school German teacher, reports that is is difficult to recruit students. Colleges and high schools are dropping German courses. It has become a crisis.

The local chapter of the American Association of Techrs of German believe it is time to call a Summit to find solutions. The summit is set for Feb. 26, 2011 at Catholic Univ. in Washington. Everyone who wants to keep German in the schools is invited, including all members of our Sociey. The AATG has asked us for financial help for the program.

## ROBERT KARL FRITZSCHE, LIFETIME DIRECTORS DIES; SOCIETY LEADER

Rob Fritzsche, who served our Society faithfully for many years, died Nov. 13 after a 3-year bout with Lou Gehrig's Disease. Rob was president of the Arion Gesangverein. For nearly 20 years he led the singing of the German and American national anthems at our annual banquet. Bob was chairman of our song-book committee and had finished a large part of it when he died. He donated his body to medical science. A memorial service was held on Dec. 11 at St. Michael the Archangel Church in Baltimore; many members of our Society attended. ### HENRY GUNTHER MONUMENT DEDICATED ON VETERANS DAY

A plaque atop a granite stone honoring Sgt. Henry N. Gunther was dedicated at an emotional ceremony on November 11, formerly celebrated as Armistice Day. Gunther was a Baltimorean who was the last American soldier killed in World War One. The war ended at 11 a.m., Nov. 11, 1918; Gunther was killed at 10:59 a.m. At 10:59 on Nov. 11, 2010, the bugler played taps and a bell tolled 11 times, following patriotic speeches and ceremonies. # LAST CHANCE TO MAKE SPECIAL GIFTS OF MEMBERSHIP IN THE SOCIETY



This program is our major membership drive and it is a temporary program which will not be repeated in the near future. The gift may be made to an individual or to a husband/wife unit.




