Maryland's Oldest Dies at 111-Agnes F. Reisenweber

Ms. Reisenweber passed away in April of this year.

Agnes was the daughter of Robert Richardson and Sadie Hubschmann. Her mother was a German immigrant. She was born October 29, 1906 and grew up in the Roland Park area of Baltimore city. Agnes married Captain William Ernest, a bay pilot. Together they had two children. Agnes remarried years after the Captain's death. She married Henry Reisenweber, a commercial artist. She too was an artist and worked primarily in water colors and oils.

She came from a long-lived family, her mother living until her late 90s and a sister until the age of 101. Agnes herself died unexpectedly from a fall.

She remained sharp and engaged until her death. She loved to read.

The name Reisenweber, from the German 'reisen' to travel and 'Weber' German for weaver, implies that there was a heritage of traveling weavers.

A.G.A.S. Hosts German-American Day



On a slightly overcast day, October 6, members from several of the German Societies and clubs met

in Washington to celebrate German-American Day at the Friendship Garden on the Mall. The date is significant and is recognized nationally as German-American Day, declared by President Ronald Reagan in 1987. The beautiful garden with the Washington Monument as the backdrop made for perfect photos.



Gerhard Meinzer, President of the Association of German-American Societies of Greater Washington, DC. (A.G.A.S) and our host for the day welcomed the guests. Greetings were also extended by our Society, by 1st VP

Jim Schaub. Several directors were also in attendance.

The National Anthems of both countries performed by the Washington Saengerbund were followed by an opening prayer, led by Pastor Katja Albrecht of the United Church.

- Proclamations presented included: The Governor of Maryland, read by Jim Schaub, 1st Vice President of the German Society of Maryland
- The Governor of Virginia, read by Hans Endrikat, President of the Washington Saengerbund.

- The Mayor of the District of Columbia, read by Charles Volkman, President of the Washington Schuplattler und Gebirgstrachten Verein, 'Washingtonia'.
- The President of the United States, read by Hardy von Auenmueller, President of the German-American Heritage Foundation.

The Presidential proclamation read that 'German Americans have helped build our Republic, shape our heritage, and enrich our culture since the arrival of the first German settlers in the New World on October 6, 1683. They brought with them and instilled in their descendants a desire for liberty and



dreams of a better life'. It continues, 'On German-American Day, we proudly celebrate the invaluable contributions that Americans of German descent-the largest ancestry group in the United States-have made to every facet of our society. Guests this year were treated to a most special treat! The Limburg Cathedral Boys Choir from Limburg, Germany provided an exceptional performance. Their repertoire included O Täler weit, o Höhen, Tanzen und Springen, Das Echolied, Sur le pont d'Avignon, Kein schöner Land, Ein Jäger aus Kurpfalz and Das Wandern ist des Müllers Lust. The choir founded in 1967, has performed at concerts both nationally and internationally and made several recordings, including television and radio productions. In 1969 the Episcopal Theological Seminary was converted into a training center known as the Boarding School of Fine Arts for the Limburg Cathedral Boys Choir. There are currently 60 boys attending the school. Their time include rigorous training schedules and ultrahigh standards for a thorough musical training, similar to the model used by other renowned boys choirs. Meet our Lifetime Director, Mary Upman



"One can make an exception only for an exceptional colleague who has contribut-

ed tremendously to this college, to foreign languages, to the small but vibrant German section at McDaniel College, and to German-American culture in Maryland." This is what Dr. Mohamed Esa said in a tribute to Dr. Mary Upman at a faculty meeting on December 6, 2005, on the occasion of her retirement after teaching at McDaniel College for 8 years.

Mary Upman is a native of a suburb of Boston, Massachusetts, the town of Weymouth. She is the daughter of Gilchrist and Helen Hurst. Early in her life she became interested in playing the violin. She took music lessons and played in the Weymouth Middle and High School orchestras. At the University of New Hampshire Summer Music Conference held in 1955, she was selected to lead the

second violin section. This was an honor that pleased her a great deal. After

she had completed her senior year at Weymouth High School, Mary

enrolled at Radcliffe College (now a part of Harvard University). She

studied hard and earned a Bachelor of Arts degree in English. She also studied German each year and gained proficiency in that language. Mary capitalized on her acquired language skills by applying for and receiving a Rotary Foundation Fellowship for International Understanding. This scholarship enabled her to study in Zurich, Switzerland, for one academic year.

During this year she gave speeches about her experiences as a Rotary Fellow to the members of various Rotary Clubs in Switzerland.

Mary continued her studies as a graduate student and teaching assistant for German in the Department of Modern European Languages at Stanford University. She earned her M.A. and Ph.D. degrees in

German. She taught full-time at Westbury Senior High School in Houston, Texas, Sam Houston State University in Huntsville, Texas, and Gulf High School in New Port Richey, Florida. In her third year of teaching at Gulf High School, she and the French and Spanish teachers there were selected as one of the 50 best foreign language

> programs at the high school level. This was an honor that was bestowed on these teachers after a thorough screening of all the applicants for the award. It pleased her and her colleagues in the foreign language department

very much. Mary continued to have a successful time teaching at Gulf High

School but she was assigned to teach English for many years while a native speaker of German received the German courses as her assignment. When Mary had reached the point where she felt free to move, she decided to hunt for a teaching position in Maryland that would allow her to introduce German into a high school that did not already



offer German. She sent her resume to the appropriate supervisors in Baltimore, Carroll and Howard Counties and she was pleased to be offered a teaching position in English at North Carroll High School with a promise to add Elementary German in the next academic year. Latin

had to be closed to facilitate the promise. However, there was no dispute about this. The Latin teacher was eager to close out Latin because he had the oversight of the annual yearbook as part of his teaching assignment and this kept him very busy.

In the fall of 1993, Mary began teaching English at North Carroll High School. When she added German to her teaching curriculum, her initial enrollment was 93 students, enough to open three sections of German 1. This gave her a good start and, over the next few years, she was able to build up the program to include German II, III and IV. She joined the American Association of Teachers of German, Maryland-DC Metro Chapter. *Continued on page –8-*



The Sergeant Henry Gunther 100th Anniversary Commemoration

The German Society of Maryland and guests gathered together at the Most Holy Redeemer Cemetery in Baltimore on November 11, 2018 to honor the 100th anniversary of the death of Sergeant Henry Gunther, who was killed one minute before the armistice to cease firing. He was the last soldier killed in World War I. The ceremony began at 10:30 in the morning and lasted until 11:45. Nearly 100 people sat inside a 20x30 ft. tent or stood outside.

After his opening remarks Director Robert Wisch introduced GSM Past President James Schaub who welcomed the attendees and gave a brief history of the German Society of Maryland. Father Bruce Lewandowski C.Ss.R., Pastor of The Sacred Heart of Jesus Catholic Church in Highlandtown where Henry Gunther was a parishioner, gave the invocation.



Following the opening ceremony The Charles Carroll of Carrollton Assembly's Color Corp, 4th Degree of the Knights of Columbus presented the Colors. Henry Gunther was a member of the Knights of Columbus, Santa Maria Council in Highlandtown. The Dan Meyer Choir sang The Star Spangled Banner and Director, BG M. Hall Worthington, led everyone in reciting The Pledge of Allegiance.

Director Wisch introduced the following honored guests: Carol Ann "Gunther" Aikman, grand-niece of Henry Gunther; Ronald Holcombe, Vice Commander, American Legion, Dept. of MD; Jere Danaher, Faithful Navigator of the Charles Carroll of Carrollton Assembly, 4th Degree Knights of Columbus; Daniel Meyer, Director of the Dan Meyer Choir; retired NBC news correspndent, James Maceda and Walter Mathers, who initiated the memorial observation for Henry Gunther ten years ago.

After the introduction of guests, The Dan Meyer Choir sang "The Clock Ticks Down", a song composed for the event by Dan Meyer about the bravery of Henry Gunther. Rev. H.J. Siegfried Otto then asked everyone to join him in eleven seconds of silence for Sgt. Henry Gunther as a brass bell

mounted on a white marble cross was rung eleven times.

Director Wisch, who is also a member of the Governor's Maryland



World War I Centennial Commission, invited Past Present Jim Schaub to the podium and presented him with a proclamation from Governor Hogan in honor of the German Society of Maryland's continued observance to keep alive the memory of Sgt. Henry Gunther.

The guest speaker for the memorial service was Ranger Vince

Vaise, a 26 year veteran of the U.S. Park Service who is currentlv Chief of Visitor Services at National Capital Parks East in Washington D.C. He wore an authentic World War I doughboy uniform complete with leggings and helmet. He enthralled the audience with his eloquence as he gave a dynamic presentation beginning with the life

of German-Americans in Baltimore prior to the United States' entry into World War I. He then told about Henry Gunther's life, his trials and tribulations during the MeuseArgonne Campaign and his final act of heroism for which he was posthumously awarded the Distinguished

Service Cross, the second highest award given for bravery. Ranger Vaise's speech was interrupted at eleven o'clock when nearby churches tolled peace bells, which were heard through-

out the cemetery, in commemoration of the end of World War I.

Following the guest speaker, Director Wisch asked Henry Gunther's great-niece, Carol Ann "Gunther" Aikman to approach the podium. She spoke of her great-uncle and his other relatives who lived near Patterson Park.

Wreaths were placed at the grave of Sgt. Gunther from the Veteran Corps Fifth Regiment Infantry, American Legion Dept. of MD and Charles Carroll of Carrolton Assembly, 4th Degree Knights of Columbus. After the laying of the wreaths, retired Army Master Sergeant Mark Elrod played Taps and the Dan Meyer Choir led everyone in singing "God Bless America".

Rev. H.J. Siegfried Otto gave the closing benediction and the colors were retired.

The entire event was broadcast live by Robert Mathers, a member of our Society and station manager of the internet radio station germanamericanradio.com. The observance to Henry Gunther was heard and viewed live by several hundred

> people. The German Society of Maryland's face book page had nearly 4,000 viewers over the next 48 hours. The entire event can still be watched by going to the website germanamericanradio.com and

clicking on the event. It will remain on the website indefinitely.

James Maceda, a retired NBC war correspondent , and his wife traveled from their home in Boliqueime, Portugal to be with the German Society of Maryland for the 100th Anniversary Commemoration of Sgt. Henry Gunther's death in World War I. Mr. Maceda has written a play about Henry Gun-



ther and recently completed a movie script about Gunther. He said that a movie will be made about Sgt. Henry Gunther within the next four years.

Christina Tkacik, a reporter for the Baltimore Sun, contacted and inter-

viewed Director Wisch several weeks before the ceremony and told him The Sun would be doing an article about our tribute to Henry Gunther. She also interviewed Directors Ted Pottast and Rev. Siegfried Otto. The lengthy article appeared on page 1 of the November 10th edition of The Sun.

Kathleen Cairns of Fox 45 TV, produced a three minute coverage of the commemoration which was shown Sunday night during their 10:00 News broadcast. The telecast was posted on the Fox45 TV website to be seen by thousands of viewers.

F. Paul Galeone, Photographers had two photographers taking candid photographs throughout the entire event. Photos may be purchased by going to Galeonecandids.com and clicking on The German Society.

Then she was invited by Mohamed Esa, at that time chapter president, to serve as the chapter's secretary and she held this position for many years. When Mary decided to leave the German program at North Carroll High School, she passed it to Amy Dreibelbis, a strong German teacher who had majored in German at Western Maryland College (now McDaniel College). However, she continued to be an active member of the Maryland-DC Metro Chapter of the AATG and to write articles about the special events held by this chapter.

One half year later Mary accepted a position to teach German on a part-time basis at McDaniel College. During her seven and a half years there she taught two levels of German language courses, an advanced course in German for Reading Knowledge, and a course in English entitled "German Women Writers." She also continued to write articles about events that honored outstanding leaders in the field of German and about teachers who are experts in specialized subjects that relate to teaching German. Many of these articles have been published in "Amerika Woche," a German language newspaper published in the United States for a wide audience of German-speaking people. In response to some of her articles, people wrote letters to thank her and she was gratified by this. The letters that she received after writing about Elie Wiesel's visit to McDaniel College were especially pleasing to her. |

Since retiring from McDaniel College, Mary has remained in touch with her colleagues in the World Languages Department and attended some of their extracurricular activities. German-American Day is a special event for her because she has participated in it every year for the twenty-four years of its existence and she is looking forward to attending German-American Day's twenty-fifth anniversary. Mary and her late husband, Techt Sgt. Phil Upman, volunteered their time, house and van for innumerable events sponsored by the German Club and House at McDaniel College. She is an active member of the German Society of Maryland and has served two terms as the Secretary of the Board of Directors. She continues to help the German Society with proofreading and updating the program script for the annual banquet in November. Mary also continues to attend cultural and musical events at McDaniel College. In her leisure time she plays the violin for enjoyment and participates in small concerts for her retirement community at Carroll Lutheran Village in Westminster.

We commend Mary for her loyal and tireless efforts to keep the German language strong and vital for students and others who want to learn more about German-American culture in Maryland.

German Parliament approves to spend 5.5 Billion Euros on Daycare by 2022

Germany's upper and lower houses of parliament on Friday December 14th approved a law that will see 5.5 billion euros (6.2 billion dollars) distributed to the country's 16 states by 2022 to improve daycare facilities for children.

The new law, drafted by Family Minister Fraziska Giffey, comes into effect at the start of 2019 and foresees some 500 million euros to be distributed to the states within the first year.

It is up to the states to determine how the money should be spent as long as the

overall goal is the improvement of pedagogic care for children, according to Giffey's ministry.

Problems such as underinvestment, underpaid educators and a lack of places have long dogged daycare facilities in Germany.

The new law is part of a drive to decrease the burden on working parents and improve educational standards that was agreed by the coalition government of Chancellor Angela Merkel.
