Presidential Proclamation on German-American Day 2019

Issued on: October 4, 2019

On German-American Day, we proudly celebrate the contributions German Americans have made to our Nation through their dedication and hard work. The seeds of German-American heritage sown over three centuries ago, when the 13 German families landed in Philadelphia in 1683, continue to flourish and prosper in our country.

From our earliest days, German Americans have helped to secure the rights we hold dear and to sustain the American experience. General Friedrich von Steuben joined the noble American cause for independence, lending critical expertise in military drills, tactics, and discipline to train the soldiers of the Continental Army. As we expanded westward, the German-born businessman Levi Strauss and his iconic namesake clothing brand became emblematic of the resilient and pioneering American spirit. Charles M. Schwab, a descendant of German immigrants, strengthened America's steel industry, and his legacy as a business tycoon continues to be synonymous with innovation and success. Today, when we enjoy music played on a Steinway piano, read a Steinbeck novel, or admire the artwork collected by painter and philanthropist Hilla Rebay and displayed in New York's stunning Guggenheim Museum, we are reminded of the countless ways German Americans have influenced our society, commerce, and culture.

This year marks the 30th anniversary of the fall of the Berlin Wall, a triumph of freedom that embodies the dedication of the United States and Germany to the rule of law and human rights. 
ed seven issues. He has written many articles on German-American topics. Randy also had a special relationship with Zion Church, making the location of this years' event special.

German Society of Maryland Receives 2019 Best of Baltimore Award

The German Society of Maryland has been selected for the 2019 Best of Baltimore Award in the Association or Organization category by the Baltimore Award Program.


Each year, the Baltimore Award Program identifies companies/associations that we believe have achieved exceptional success in their local community and category.

These exceptional companies/associations help make the Baltimore area a great place to live, work and play.

Various sources of information were gathered and analyzed to choose the winners in each category. The 2019 Baltimore Award Program focuses on quality, not quantity. Winners are determined based on the information gathered both internally by the Baltimore Award Program and data provided by third parties.

The GSM's First President

Who was the FIRST President of the German Society of Maryland?



That honor goes to Dr. Charles Frederick Wiesenthal (1726 to 1789).

Dr. Wiesenthal's father, Johann Mattheus Wiesenthal was a barber in the city of Pasewalk in Pomerania, Prussia. A new medical regulation passed in 1729 allowed him to be confirmed a surgeon, which was not uncommon at that time. His connections as such gave his sons, Johann Christopf and Karl (Charles) Frederick to attend the regimental school, which provided superior training than the ordinary schools of that time.

There isn't much known about further training. We do know he moved to Strasburg in 1747 and practiced there for several years. It is also known that he arrived in Baltimore in 1755, where he became naturalized in 1771. He was appointed Surgeon General of Maryland troops (salary 35shillings per day) in 1777. He with several other physicians formed a medical society (12-16-1788). He is known as the 'Father of Medicine' in Baltimore

and this was the first medical society. He founded the first medical school in Maryland at Fayette and Frederick Streets. This he did as a private undertaking in order to train physicians. The success of this endeavor led to the medical faculty of the University of Maryland in 1807, which then assumed the responsibilities of training medical professionals.

In the book, 'The Maryland Germans', by Dieter Cuntz, he is called the first truly significant German in Baltimore. He has been memorialized at Zion through one of their stained glass windows (middle lower panel of the south wall window in the narthex). As a member of Zion, it was here he was elected as a permanent elder in 1769.

After Dr. Wiesenthal's death, his son Andrew, continued to teach courses on Anatomy and Surgery until his death in 1798.

Dr. Wiesenthal was a founder and the first President of our Society. He was the first President of the medical society organized as a result of a convention held in Baltimore in 1788 to acknowledge and plan for the regulation and continued professionalism of the medical profession.

Randall P. Donaldson, Ph.D.

The German Society of Maryland selected Randall P. Donaldson to be honored with our 'Distinguished Service Award' at our anniversary banquet in November. His dedicated loyalty to his students and his willingness to be involved in challenging efforts such as the Zion Christmas Market, the Zion Forum for German Culture, and the hosting of the national meeting of the Society for German American Studies here in Baltimore have earned him high accolades. He has also received many other praises.

Randall 'Randy' was born in Ohio. He grew up in Southern California and attended Pomona College there. He moved to Baltimore in 1967 to attend graduate school at the Johns Hopkins University. Fifty-two years later he is still in Baltimore. On the personal side, Randy met and married a fellow graduate student in German. They spent the first year of married life in Cologne, working on their studies and enjoying the many cultural opportunities. Their return to Baltimore in the fall of 1971 was difficult, primarily because the number of tenure-track openings in German was dwindling at a staggering rate. However, Randy was lucky. After taking the civil service exam and resigning himself to a career outside of academe, he received two job offers. The first was from Loyola College, and he accepted it gladly.

At this point in Randy's career a number of people, many well known to members of the German Society, began to play an im-



portant role: Dr. Hanna Geldrich (later Geldrich-Leffman), Dr. Carrie May Kurrelmeyer Zintl, Professors Harold Jantz and Adolf Zucker, Pastor Friedemann H. B. Penner and independent scholar Klaus Wust. Hanna Geldrich was the chair of Modern Languages at Loyola and active in both the German Society and the Society for the History of Germans in Maryland. Dr. Zintl was teaching Classics at Loyola and actively honoring her father by preserving his significant contributions to German literature and philology.

In the early 1980s Dr. Zintl asked Randy to join the Board of the Society for the History of the Germans in Maryland. When Elizabeth Litzinger later stepped down as Treasurer, Randy succeeded her. Shortly thereafter he was asked to take on the editorship of the journal of the SHGM, "The Report", when Klaus Wust retired. Since that time Randy has served as both Treasurer of the Society for the History of the Germans in Maryland and the editor of its journal. He has edited seven issues of "The Report". The final volume under his editorship will appear in the spring 2020. In addition, he has co-edited a foreign language pedagogy, "Changing Language Education through CALL (Computer-Assisted Language Learning)" with Loyola colleague Margaret Haggstrom. He has also published more than a dozen articles on German-American topics, including an extensive essay entitled: "William A. Potthast" about Potthast Bros. Furniture for the on-line "Immigrant Entrepreneurship Project" sponsored by the German Historical Institute in Washington, D.C.

Through the decades Randy has remained at Loyola, now Loyola University of Maryland, teaching German language and graduate courses in Liberal Studies. He has provided an historical introduction to the reprint of Dieter Cunz' "The Maryland Germans." He has also served as president of the Maryland Chapter of the Goethe Society and national president of the Society for German-American Studies. He has been a board member and officer of a number of other scholarly organizations, most notably Phi Sigma Iota, the national honor society for foreign languages.

Randall P. Donaldson is an outstanding professor and a dedicated contributor to the German-American community in Baltimore. We congratulate Randy and wish him and happy and healthy retirement.

German coin collectors are in a tizzy attempting to get hold of the new specially minted five euro coin. It is desired because of a new innovative design. Embedded between the inner circle of the metal and the outer rim is a green polymer plastic ring.

The minting process isn't exactly new with the first use occurring in 2016 when Germany issued a five euro coin with a blue polymer ring with the name 'Planet Erde' (Planet Earth).

The new coin named "Gemaessigte Zone" (Temperate

Zone) is the third of a five-part series titled "Climate Zones of the Earth" which is to be completed by 2021. The first of the new five-euro coin series was "Tropische Zone" (Tropical Zone) with a red polymer ring that was issued in April 2017. Last April came the second coin, "Subtropische Zone" (Subtropical Zone) with an orange polymer ring.

A total of 3.4 million of the new five-euro coins are to be issued, including 400,000 bearing a higher mirror-finish minting quality. The Bundesbank is issuing the simpler mint-condition coins in its 35

branches around the country - with a limit of one coin per person. The mirror-finish coin will be sold via the official German Sales Agency for Collector's Coins (VfS).

The new coin may be used for everyday purchases, but because of the rush, it appears more are being hoarded than used.
