DR. HELINSKI GIVEN LEADERSHIP AWARBY BY TEACHERS OF GERMAN

The American Association of Teachers of German has named Dr. Maureen Helinski to receive its highest honor, the prestigious Friends of German Award. She was selected for her exemplary leadership in the advocacy of German language education and for her outstanding support and promotion of the study of the German language at all levels, local, regional and national. The presentation will take place at the AATG's annual meeting on Nov. 28 in Boston. Her selection was made by the national executive council of the AATG. Dr. Helinski has taught German at the high school and college level in Maryland. She has served as a Director of our Society and is the webmaster of the Society's website. She has been a member of our Education Committee for many years and has serviced the Society in many capacities.

Our most recent event, "The Great German Picnic" has been a wonderful experience. Over 200 people came to the historic location of the Battle of Baltimore at North Point State Park, where one of own vice presidents of the past, General John Stricker defeated the British in the war of 1812.

Some of our Old Timers cherished more recent memories when they as children came over the water to Bayshore Park and Trolley Station by way of the trolley cars.

For all of us this picnic will be lodged in our memories when on arrival we heard that our caterer Big Boy Foods would not show up. After a moment of paralyzing panic four ladies of our society took the initiative and went out to buy enough fried chidden, pizzas, and cold cuts with all the condiments, Within an hour they were back and all who stayed - that is most people - had enough to eat.

Beck's Beer was available from the beginning because in wise foresight Ted Potthast had brought it into the park himself. We have to thank Mr. Rowland King who was our "Biermeister" and made sure only ice cold cans were served.

The presence of the 21 piece brass band, the "Dockenspielers" from York. PA contributed significantly to the success of the picnic. Members of the "Arion Gesangverein" led in the singing of familiar German American favorites during the afternoon Of course we opened the picnic with the presentation of flags from America and Germany by a three men color guard in historic uniforms, One gentleman wore an 1812 Pomeranian Prussian Landwehr uniform while the other two wore historic American and British uniforms. We sang the national anthems of Germany and America and remembered our very own vice president of the Society, General John Stricker, for his victory over the British in the Battle of Baltimore in this historic location. Mr. Edward Seufert, Royal Marines Re-enactor - a Star Spangled 200 Conference Presenter - illustrated the battle action on a superbly detailed giant colored canvas map.

The amazingly energetic co-chairman of the picnic, Mr. Walt Mathers, acted as a master of ceremony, getting us going and calling out numbers for door prizes with a huge bull horn. All the prizes he had secured through untiring solicitations. We also have to thank him for securing the historic location, and inviting Mr. Seufert and the Dockenspieler Brass Band. For me Walt Mather's website "Der Wecker" is not just a reminder of the German paper or periodical that existed in Baltimore but a symbol for his seemingly unbinding energy. The old German "Wecker" or alarm clock could even raise dead from their sleep.

Of course the other half of the success for the picnic goes to our treasurer and former president Ted Potthast and his dear wife Connie. They published and publicized the event several times, collected the checks, made the lists, signed people in and paid all the bills and some refunds for the picnic to people who did not stay.

Special thanks go to our "Food Angels": Mrs. Shelley Dolch Arnold, Mrs. Jean Arp, Mrs. Betty Niemann, and Dr. Kim Wittstadt.

We enjoyed the singing of the Arion members: Mr. Brad Schlegel and his sister, the Reverend Beth Stoverschlegel and Mrs. Cathy Barnes.





























THANKS TO ALL THOSE WHO HELPED ON OUR "THE GREAT GERMAN PICNIC"

WHAT DO YOU HAVE FOR GERMAN AMERICAN DAY?

Middle and high school students studying German in Maryland come together each year at McDaniel College for German American Day - an event at which they learn about the German language and culture, and in particular the effect which Immigrants from Germany have influenced or affected our lives,. The person who established the event and who does the most to make it a success is Dr. Mohamed Esu, professor of German at the college and one of the directors of our Society. His influence as a leading teacher of German in the USA has been acknowledged by the German Ambassador awarding him Germany's Cross of Merit. Dr. Esa is reaching out to the German American community for help in imparting knowledge to the young students. What can you tell these culture-thirsty young people about your own experiences? If you were born in Germany, how did you adapt to life in America and what was it like learning a new language and living in a different culture. What was it like when you lived in Germany, attended school; how was it different from the USA? What is it like today? Do you have a background in German history which you can share with the students? How do these topics relate to today? The theme of the event is "Got Deutsch - German in the 21st Century". There are many topics the students want to learn about. CENTENARY OF VON STEUBEN STATUE TO BE COMMEMORATED DEC, 10, 2010

On Dec. 10, 1910 a statue of Baron von Steuben, the German general who trained George Washington's army during the American Revolution, was unveiled in Lafayette Park in D.C. across from the White House amidst pomp and ceremony. President Taft attended and his daughter unveiled the statue. The unveiling was attended by 10,000, including 1,000 singers from the Northeast Saengerbund. There were speeches by congressmen and the German ambassador and

music was provided by the Marine Band. The event was followed by a parade. We understand that there may be an event commemorating the 100th anniversary, and if so, our Society will plan to have a presence at it.

OUR MEMBERS ARE WONDERFUL

Our recent picnic served to demonstrate what a fine group of people our members are. Their friendliness, their upbeat attitude in the face of adversity, their quick witted action showed the best of our heritage.

WORLD POWER BRITAIN BEATEN BY MARYLANDERS SEPTEMBER, 1814

The State of Maryland is planning a two-year commemoration, commencing in June, 2012, of the events which led to the Maryland militia defeating the world's greatest army in The Battle of Baltimore in September, 1814. Baltimore County is gearing up to commemorate the Battle of North Point which set up the American victory in Baltimore. Our Society will form a committee to participate in the celebration by the local governments, with our emphasis on General John Stricker, "The Hero of the Battle of North Point" who was a vice president of The German Society of Maryland and who was a signatory to the charter of our Society issued by the Maryland legislature in 1818. If you are a history buff, please sign up to join our committee: we need ideas on projects which will make known the participation of the many members of our Society who fought alongside General Stricker in the battles which saved our nation from domination by a foreign power. Unless we take firm action in getting our message out, the country will not realize that the heroic action of MD German Americans played a major role in our country's freedom.

TWO GERMAN AMERICANS VIE FOR MARYLAND'S GOVERNORSHIP

Governor Martin O'Malley and former governor Robert Ehrlich (a member of our Society) oppose one another in the Nov. gubernatorial race. O'Malley's mother is of German origin; Ehrlich's ancestry is German, as is the origin of his name. O'Malley stresses his Irish side. Regardless of the outcome of the election, Maryland will have a German American as governor.

SOCIETY MEMBERSHIP DOWN

Our Society office manager, Baerbel Otto, announced at the annual meeting that our Society now stands at 534 "units" A unit consists of an individual or a man and a woman as a unit, so that the actual number of members is about 800. At one point there were more than 1,000 members, but many have been dropped for nonpayment of dues. With investment income down and a poor stock market, our investment revenue, once our principal source of income, has now taken second place to dues. Our membership chairman, Dandridge Brooke, has set a target of 20 new members per month. If this can be achieved, dues as a source of funding our projects could increase by several thousand dollars per year. Our finance committee has also changed many of our investments to concentrate on production of income while still hoping for a modest growth in valuation.

FRANK AND AUMAN PROPOSE GERMAN AMERICAN MONTH FOR MARYLAND

Bill Frank and Susan Auman, members of our Society and also members of the Maryland House of Delegates were in attendance at our picnic at North Point State Park on June 26. They announced their intention to introduce a resolution in the General Assembly to designate October as German American Month in Maryland. The strong German heritage of our state should be recognized by such an action. 2011, Bill and Susan are seeking other members of the legislature to co-sponsor the resolution. We will be asking our members to contact their legislators in the House and Senate to vote for the resolution. We also need a large group to turn out at the hearing (probably in the first two weeks of February, 2011) to show the General Assembly the support of the German Americans.

MEMBERS HONORED BY GILMAN

Lauren Rizzo and Paul-Gerhard Otto were recently honored by The Gilman School for their services and achievements. Lauren demonstrated initiative, enthusiasm and the positive attitude which bodes well for the future of the school. Paul's cheerfulness, enthusiastic and selfless participation has endeared him to the entire Gilman community.
