# NOTICE OF PROPOSED AMENDMENTS TO BYLAWS

# DEATH OF FRED WEHRENBERG

Past President Frederick Wehrenberg died on January 10. Fred served many years as a director and a leader of our Society. While serving as president his wife died, leaving him heart-broken and in a state of depression. He continued serving as president until a life-changing event required him to suddenly move to Chicago. One night Fred showed up at the door of then vice president Don Tillman, handed him all the documents relating to the ongoing events of the Society and announced he was on his way to Chicago. and Don was now the president. A surprised Don Tillman took the helm of the Society and ran it successfully for the next 5 years. Fred was elected a lifetime director for his lengthy service and his conscientious stewardship as an officer and director.

We mourn his loss and extend our condolences to his family.

### THE STRICKER MONUMENT

Our Society has acquired a monument to General John Stricker, and has arranged with the City of Baltimore that it be placed on Federal Hill. Past president Brigitte Fessenden is chairperson of the committee to arrange for the dedication of the monument. It is expected that the event will be well publicized and that it will be well attended by many members of our Society and by dignitaries from our State, by national German American organizations and by officials representing the Federal Republic of Germany and of Switzerland (the homeland of the Stricker family). Since the statue will be placed on city-owned property, the timing and other details are subject to the approval of city officials. Details of the event will be made public by the committee soon.

# PREPARING FOR OCTOBER

The Maryland legislature declared October to be German American Heritage month. How the month will be celebrated was left to the community, namely, to us. The government is not going to do anything or spend any money. It's up to us to tell about the many contributions of the Germanspeaking people who helped build and defend this country. As an important part of that community, the German Society of MD has a heavy burden placed on our shoulders. We plan things on our own and we join with other organizations to make known the heritage. Some of the things already planned for October are:

1. Spreading the knowledge of Gen. John Stricker, the hero of the Battle of North Point.

- 2. Honoring the memory of Major General Baron Johann deKalb, a Bavarian who commanded the Maryland Line in the Revolutionary War.
- 3. Participating in the Oktoberfest of the Buergerverein at the Timonium fairgrounds.
- 4. Promoting the commemoration of the death of Sgt. Henry Gunther, a German American from Baltimore, the last soldier killed in World War I.
- 5. Aiding German American Day for German language students held at McDaniel College.
- 6. Distribution of printed materials about Maryland's German American heritage.
- 7. Activities of our individual members to learn about our heritage and to teach it to our own families and friends.

# KARTOFFEL, BITTE

Thanks to an article in the DANK Journal (German American National Congress) we have the statistics on the acreage in Germany devoted to vegetables. Potatoes do not even rank in the top 5. Germany's favorite veggie: Asparagus, at 24,100 hectares, or 20% of the cultivated farmed land in Germany. The next 4, in hectares, are: carrots, 10,200; onions, 9,700; cabbage, 5,800; and cauliflower, 4,300. 1 hectare = 2.47105381 acres.

### **ERRORS: STRICKER & THE FLAG**

Thanks to our member Wayne Schaumburg, we learn of some errors in last month's article about John Stricker and Mary Pickersgill. Mary was paid a total of \$574.44, not the \$345 we cited. The project took 8 weeks, not the 3 mentioned in the article. And the third commissioner who authorized the flag was Col. William McDonald, not Col. Armstead. Wayne also pointed out that John Stricker was related by marriage to Mary Pickersgill.

#### **ROBERT C. KLEIN , WWII VET**

Towson resident Robert Klein died Feb. 4 of a stroke. As an army sergeant he helped liberate the Landsberg concentration camp in Bavaria in April, 1945. He seldom spoke of that experience, having been so horrified by it. In an interview many years later, he described the piles of dead bodies and the live Jews barely skeletons. He gave them candy but they were so emaciated it made them sick. A lengthy obituary by Fred Rasmussen appeared in the Sun of Feb.12. Mr. Klein returned from the war, graduated from college and became managing partner of a prominent Maryland insurance brokerage firm. Many members of the Klein family have been and are members of our Society.

# AN ADVISORY BOARD?

Most members have talents and skills which can help our Society's mission. They can't serve on the Board of Directors because they don't have the time, or can't take on additional responsibilities, or have limited interests. Yet, if called upon to help in a special project, they are willing to do so. Many non-profits have advisory boards; all hospitals do. The advisors are called upon for their individual expertise. If the Society should establish such a Board, would you be willing to serve?

#### **OUR MEETING DATE**

Until the early 1990's our annual meeting was held in February. One year a series of ice storms caused it to be canceled three times. The last time one of our directors did not get the cancellation notice and showed up for the meeting, finding himself waiting all alone. He was so upset he resigned from the board. To avoid future weather problems, the Society changed the date of the annual meeting to the Friday after Easter, thus eliminating the likelihood of blizzards and ice storms.

### THE WILKENS FAMILY

The name Wilkens appears prominently in the membership rosters of our Society in the 1800's.

We read of a German American named William Wilkens, a wealthy but eccentric Baltimorean who rose from rags to riches and became famous for owning the world's largest pocket watch. Wilkens began his commercial career collecting hair and bristles from the Baltimore slaughter houses, and carrying them home in a wheelbarrow. As he prospered, he bought a white horse and a wagon. When the horse grew old and retired, Mr. Wilkens cared for him tenderly and when it died, he purchased a plot of ground opposite his factory and residence where he buried the horse.

He ordered his great watch from London in 1866 and it was finished in 1869 at a cost of \$2,500.It was 4 inches wide, gold and weighed 2 pounds. He had special vests made with large pockets. The massive gold chain to which the watch was attached was 4 feet long, cost \$800 and weighed 4 pounds. He wore the chain around his neck. His beloved white horse received equal prominence with himself on the engraving on the watch case. Wilkens wore the watch till the day he died. ### THE HAMBURGER: ALL-AMERICAN

The history of the hamburger is set forth in the Feb. 23 issue of TIME magazine. It was invented in New Haven, Conn. by a Danish immigrant named Louis Larsen who named it because it had the same ingredients as a German dish called the Hamburg Steak, ground beef. The hamburger was quickly adopted by Americans. 119 years later, in 2014, we Americans ate 9 billion of them. McDonald's sells the most, but it is facing competition from small boutique burger shops springing up all over the USA.

### THE HISTORY CHANNEL...

...has been broadcasting documentaries of POW camps in the USA during WWII. There were 500 POW camps with 450,000 prisoners. (20 camps in Maryland). Many years later,a large group of former POW's were interviewed for the documentary. They said the 2 years in the camp was the best time of their entire lives. Nearly 200,000 German POW's returned as immigrants to America.

### DR. HANS G. GOEDICKE, 88

Dr. Goedicke, an internationally renown Egyptologist, died Feb. 24. Born in Vienna, Austria, he was drafted into the German army at age 16. He received his doctorate from the Univ. of Vienna, after which he worked as an archeologist in Egypt. He came to Johns Hopkins in Baltimore in 1960 and ultimately became head of its Dept. of Egyptology. In 1982 he presented solid evidence that the Exodus of the Israelites from Egypt occured in 1477 B. C, 200 years prior to the then accepted timing; and he also confirmed that the parting of the sea, the drowning of the Egptian army and the escape of the Jews was possible, based on geological evidence of volcanic activity. and not myth as claimed by many.

He resided in Guilford until his death. Dr. Goedicke had friends who are members of our Society.

#### THE U-DEUTSCHLAND IRON CROSS

The archives of our Society contain an iron cross which is a souvenir of the 1916 visit to Baltimore of the U-boat and its captain, Paul Koenig. Walt Mathers, researcher par excellence, has uncovered the history of the cross. Iron ingots, carried as ballast in the submarine, were donated to the VDA, a wartime charity for widows and orphans, . It presented the crosses to those who contributed to its cause. They turned over the iron to G. Krug & Sons to make the iron crosses and Hans Schuler, a Baltimore artist, was commissioned to make coins for each side of the iron cross, one side with the image of Capt. Koenig and the other of the U-Deutschland. When Capt. Koenig came to Baltimore in 1932, he took back to Germany all of the undistributed crosses which had been held in storage here. What happened to them after Hitler came into power is a mystery. The Society's iron cross will be on display during our commemoration in July, 2016 of the centenary of the historic visit of the world's first commercial submarine.

# JUDGE CORNELIUS F. SYBERT, JR.

Judge Sybert, a member of our Society who cherished his German American heritage, often made our summer picnic a family reunion, bringing a dozen of his relatives to the event. He died Feb. 23 at age 86. "Neil" retired as Judge of the Circuit Court for Howard County, where he previously served as a prosecutor, a defense attorney, and land-use attorney and as president of the county bar association. He was a graduate of Loyola High School, Loyola College and the University of Maryland Law School. He served in the army during the Korean war. He followed in the footsteps of his father, C. Ferdinand Sybert, who was the State's Attorney for Howard County, a Circuit Court Judge and a member of the Maryland Court of Appeals. Judge Sybert was always most respectful of all who appeared before him, plaintiffs, defendants, witnesses and attorneys, said Ted Potthast another member of our Society who, as a trial attorney, tried many cases in Judge Sybert's courtroom. He is part of Maryland's German American heritage and will be long remembered within our Society.

### **GERMAN SOCIETY MEDALS**

For more than 100 years, the German Society of Maryland has awarded its medal to citizens who have performed significant services which benefit the community and which promote the ideals and principles of our Society. In some years the medal has several recipients. 2015 is one such year. No medals have been awarded for several years and a goodly number of persons, especially among our own directors, were selected to receive the medal. Most have served the Society and the entire German

American community for many years and have been leaders of a number of organizations.

#### LISTING OF RECIPIENTS

Our director **BETTY NIEMANN** was president of The Baltimore Kickers, the Edelweiss Club, vice president of the Buergerverein, a delegate to the GAV, (German American Verein) and council member of Zion Church. Her husband BRUNO (DUTCH) NIEMANN aided her in all these efforts and himself served as a director of Club Fidelitas and on the Zion council.

**CHRISTEL VAN DER BERG** served as our corporate secretary for many years, was a broadcaster on the Edelweiss Hour and is a lifetime director.

**JANE AWALT** served as a director and is a special benefactor of the Society.

**THOMAS A. WERNER** served as president of our Society, of the Baltimore Kickers and of the Burgerverein, currently serving as its treasurer. Tom is also our society's vice president for finance.

**BRIGITTE FESSENDEN** staffed our office, pro bono, in times when we had no office manager; served as chair of many committees; was our president for three years; currently is very active with our Society and others and is president of the Goethe Society.

#### **OTHER PAST PRESIDENTS**

It is also customary for a past president to be awarded the Society's medal and those others who are recipients are: JOHN AYMOLD, THE REV. H. J. SIEGFRIED OTTO. MICHAEL J. NIEBERDING. THEODORE J. POTTHAST, JR., JAMES SCHAUB, and FREDERICK WEHRENERG, posthumously.

#### **OUTSTANDING COMMUNITY SERVICE**

**DR. MAUREEN HELINSKI**, our webmaster and Chair of the Education Committee and of AATG committees. **BOB SHEPHERD**, president for many years of the Deutschamerikanische Buergerverein von Maryland.

#### LEGISLATORS

Three members of the Maryland legislature have also been selected for the medal: **SENATOR NANCY KLAUSMEIER**, **DELEGATE SUSAN AUMANN** and **FORMER DELEGATE WILLIAM FRANK**. These are those most responsible for having October designated as German American Heritage Month in Maryland.

#### STRICKER BUST DEDICATION

The Society has approval to place our monument to Gen. John Stricker on Federal Hill in Baltimore. Stricker was a founder and a vice president of our Society and lead the Maryland militia in the victory in the War of 1812. We hope that we will be joined in the dedication by all the members of the Buergerverein, by the national German American organizations, by the embassies of the Federal Republic of Germany and of Switzerland (the Stricker family was Swiss). by the Maryland National Guard, the successor to the Maryland Militia. And by all our members. Our Stricker Committee has a job on its hands, getting all these people to the top of the hill.

# THE SOLDIER & THE NURSE

A story about our Vice President and Director, Dr. Armin Mruck: About 10 years ago, Dr. Mruck received an e-mail from Hannelore Grimm, now living near Magdeburg, Germany. She wondered whether he was the Armin Mruck whom she had taken care of as a wounded soldier in a life and death situation in a Luebeck hospital in April/May, 1945. Together they had learned of Adolf Hitler's death. Together they had experienced the end of World War II. Schwester/ nurse Hannelore had seen many soldiers die. She was determined not to let one more soldier die as much as it were in her power. She did succeed. Armin Mruck is still alive and active today. For half a century, Hannelore Grimm and Armin Mruck had lost all contact to each other. But they had never forgotten each other. Armin Mruck in one way had owed her his survival. She did not forget him because of her dedication to make this wounded soldier well again. One Christmas she mentioned the story to her computersavvy son who then told her it was rather easy to find out if Armin Mruck was still among the living by going into the internet and google his name. In this way Hannelore Grimm did find his name and e-mail address and immediately sent that e-mail to Reisterstown, MD where the Mruck family lived. Fifty years had passed and Hannelore and Armin felt the need to write to each other on a regular basis and to tell their story, which was first published by BIS, then by the University Press of Oldenburg University, and more recently by the popular Zeitgut Verlag/Berlin. In the late 1980's Dr. Mruck had helped establish a partnership between Towson University, of which he has been a member since 1965 and the Carl von Ossietzky Universitaet Oldenburg. ### **NEW MEMBERS:**

**ROBERT WISCH** was recruited by our director, Gen. Hall Worthington. Robert was the principal speaker at the deKalb ceremony in Annapolis in 2014. He is the Commander of the Veterans Corps of the 5th Regiment Infantry and holds the rank of Lieut. Col. Robert was the inspiration of the 2012 deKalb commemoration ceremonies. Maryland's 5th Regiment was established in 1774 and formed a member unit in the Maryland-Delaware Line which was commanded in the Revolutionary War by Maj. Gen. Baron Johann deKalb. Col Wisch's article in the 5th Regiment newsletter brought about the first commemoration of deKalb in more than 100 years, in 2012, then sponsored by the Veterans Corps and the Society for the History of the Germans in MD. In 2013 the German Society joined in sponsoring the event.

JOHN H. FOERTSCHBECK, SR. was encouraged to join our Society when he attended the ceremonies at the grave of Sgt. Henry Gunther on Veterans' Day John is a scholar of the history of Maryland Germans. He has published five books on local German history, most recently a magnificent survey of German churches, full of photographs and text, the result of several years of research, interviews and travel. On informal occasions, he can easily be spotted by his baseball cap imprinted with the logo "German John". Future issues of this newsletter will have descriptions and reviews of his books. They are full of local German American history and lore.

### THE WORKING POOR

Shawn Dippel,a lifetime member of our Society, has formed a nonprofit, 501(c)(3) organization with an unusual purpose: to help those who are working to support their families, but who nevertheless can't earn enough to pay their bills. Economic policies have caused many employers to cut workers' hours and keep wages low. Often their working status disqualifies them from welfare benefits. The new organization, Starboard Society, seeks out struggling families and helps them meet their heating and rent bills, put food on the table and to solve similar problems. Good work, Shawn!

### **1812 MEMORIAL IN BLADENSBURG**

4,500 British troops, veterans of the Napoleonic War, defeated 6,000 Americans in the Battle of Bladensburg. MD and marched into Washington to burn the White House. (Those same troops were repelled by Gen. John Stricker and the militia at Baltimore.) In August, 2014 a large memorial was dedicated in Bladensburg to the soldiers who fought the losing battle. The 20-foot statue features the wounded Commodore Joshua Barney being helped to his feet by Charles Ball, a former slave who served in the navy under Barney. The cost was paid for by local, state and federal agencies and some local businesses. The Gen John Stricker monument is being paid for solely by The German Society of Maryland.
