ESSAY CONTEST WINNERS

The German Society sponsored an essay contest for Maryland junior high school students, on the subject of General John Stricker, Hero of the Battle of North Point. General Stricker was an incorporator of the German Society of Md. and its vice president for ten years. His defeat of the British in 1814 at North Point in Baltimore County effectively ended the War of 1812.

The winners were: 1st prize, \$500.00 to Dustin Kluttz, Our Lady of Mt. Carmel School, Middle River; 2nd prize, \$300 Sandy Stevens, Our Lady of Mt. Carmel School; 3rd prize, Benjamin A. Leuthold, Immaculate Conception School, Towson.

The prizes were awarded on May 10th at a well-attended ceremony in the Adlersaal at Zion Church, City Hall Plaza. Dustin Kluttz read his winning essay to the group. Copies of the essay will be distributed to members of the Society.

NIEBERDING ADDRESSES AATG AT WESTERN MARYLAND COLLEGE

Mike Nieberding, chairman of the Society's Youth Committee, told the Maryland Chapter of the American Association of Teachers of German, at its Spring conference on April 29 at Western Maryland College, about the Society's program for encouraging young people to study German language and culture. Fifty teachers, from Maryland's universities, colleges and high schools attended the day-long event. The conference's theme was "Building Bridges for Future Partnerships". Dr. Mohamed Esa, President of the Maryland Chapter, explained the need to build bridges between the high school language students and the German Departments in the universities, to interest them in continuing their German studies at the higher academic levels. President Esa also proposed the establishment of a statewide organization of high school German language students, for academic events. He referred to a similar organization in Virginia, which is very popular among the students and has resulted in an increase in interest in German studies.

Ted Potthast, German Society president, participated in the discussions, pointing out that such a project lies within the scope of the German Society's mission statement. He suggested that the Society join the new organization to assist AATG and the students.

OFFICE SECRETARY NEEDED

Dorothy Galway, the Society's office secretary for over 10 years, is retiring and moving to Texas to live with her daughter. She has tendered her resignation, effective August 1st. The Society is actively recruiting for her replacement. The secretarial job is part-time. three days per week, plus attendance at the various activities of the Society. German Society Awards Language Prizes

The Society granted prizes of \$100 to each student in a Maryland high school who scored above the 90th percentile in the language exam given by the American Association of Teachers of German. \$50 was awarded to those exceeding the 85th percentile. Since only the top students take the exam, these scores indicate an excellent mastery of the language at the high school level. The awards were presented on May 12th at the Adlersaal of the Zion Church at City Hall Plaza, Baltimore. More than 150 members of the Society and families of the winners attended the ceremony. 


GERMAN LANGUAGE SUMMER SCHOOL


LEARNING CENTER NAMED FOR GERMAN NUN


A learning career center for inner city women, recently established in downtown Baltimore, has been named in honor of Caroline Friess, a member of the religious order of the School Sisters of Notre Dame. The new institution is called The Caroline Center. Mother Caroline Friess arrived in the United States from Germany in 1847 and established her headquarters in Baltimore. In 45 years she opened 265 schools and orphanages in 17 states. The concept of the Caroline Center is to educate unemployed women, to enable them to find productive employment, obtain self respect and get off welfare. The idea is that of Sister Kathleen Feeley, who will manage the facility. Sister Kathleen was president of the College of Notre Dame of Maryland for many years.





WHY JOIN THE GERMAN SOCIETY?

America is losing the memory of its ethnic roots. It is especially true of Americans of German ancestry, who easily dissolve in the "great American melting pot."

Many ethnic groups have nation-wide holidays to make them aware of their ethnicity. St. Patrick's Day, Columbus Day and Martin Luther King Day are marked with parades and parties to remind the Irish, the Italian and the African Americans of their heritage. Public schools devote the month of February to "Black History Month". There is nothing to remind children of a German-speaking ancestry (Germans, Austrians, Swiss) of their heritage.

If we don't make a special effort to hold on to the German heritage, culture and traditions, they will be lost to future generations. Today few American schools even teach German as an elective foreign language. (Amazingly, in Japan, 68% of the students study German.)

The German Society of Maryland fosters the preservation and promotion of the German heritage, language and traditions. Your membership in the Society throws your support behind these goals.

As a member, you are invited to join in our activities, but are not required to attend any of them. There are many people who want to help preserve the German traditions but are unable to take an active role. However, just being a member and on our mailing list will make you aware of the happenings in the community and enable you to pass on, in your own way, your ethnic traditions and culture.



ST ALPHONSUS CHURCH **MARKS 150 YEARS**

Founded in 1845 by Germans at the corner of Park Ave. and Saratoga St., ceremonies last month marked St. chairman of the executive War hero John Eager Howard deeded the Gentlemen of Baltimore Co." They then erected St. John's German Church on the site. In 1840 the church was taken over by the Redemptorist order of priests who built a new and larger church on the site and changed its name to St. Alphonsus. From 1847-49 its pastor was St. John N. Neumann, the only male American citizen canonized as a saint by the Catholic Church.

"MEYER" IS MOST FREQUENT GERMAN NAME IN AMERICA

Professor Eichhoff of Penn State U. spoke at the annual meeting of the Society for the History of The Germans in Maryland, on April 18th. His speech was warmly received. It covered the clash of German names with American culture and the English language. He pointed out that the name Meyer, while the 5th most common name in Germany, is 1st in America. The reason is because it cannot Anglicized. Müller, Schmidt and Fischer, the three most popular German names, were frequently changed to Miller, Smith and Fisher by the German immigrants. Professor Eichhoff gave many examples of spelling changes which also created seemingly new, English names with historical English background. For example, all Snyders were originally Schneiders.

Prof. Eichhoff's speech will appear next year as an article in The Report, the publication of The Society for the History of the Germans in Maryland. Each member of that society receives a copy of The Report as part of the annual \$15 dues.



BENEFIT CONCERT FOR GERMAN CULTURAL CENTER

GRAMM, PART-TIME MARYLANDER, IS GRANDSON OF GERMAN IMMIGRANT

Phil Gramm, Senator from Texas and one of the Republican frontrunners for President in 1996, is the grandson of a German immigrant. The senator's father joined the US army at age 15, served in WWI and rose to the rank of sergeant, later teaching at the infantry school at Ft. Benning, GA. Gramm is a part-time Marylander. He owns a summer house on the Eastern Shore.

BARBARA FRITCHIE, GERMAN MARYLANDER

A German woman, Barbara Fritchie (nee Hauser) proudly flaunted her pariotism when she defied Stonewall Jackson by displaying the Stars & Stripes from her attic window as he marched through the city of Frederick. She is immortalized in Whittier's poem, known to all school children: 'Shoot if you must, this old gray head, but spare your country's flag,' she said."

BABE RUTH'S GERMAN ANCESTRY



February 6th marked the 100th anniversary of Babe Ruth's birth, and it was celebrated with great fanfare by seminars and publications throughout the country. The baseball hero was born in

Baltimore at 216 Emory Street in 1895. His home is now The Babe Ruth Museum. Baltimore newspapers ran articles all week long and the Baltimore Sun printed a full page color poster of the Babe, plus a 14 page commemorative section. Among the thousands of facts and hundred thousand words in the news articles, no mention was made of his German ancestry.

DECLARATION OF INDEPENDENCE FIRST PRINTED IN GERMAN

Before it was published in English, the official Declaration of Independence was first printed in a German newspaper, on July 9, 1776. The paper was the "Pennsylvania Staatsbote", published in Philadelphia.

C.A. KUEHNLE, JR. CAMOUFLAGE EXPERT, PAINTER

Christian Albert Kuehle, Jr. died March 30th at age 83. He owned Baltimore-based Kuehnle-Wilson Paints, its plant located near Fort McHenry. He did all the camouflage work on the Martin bombers in WW II. He also painted the House and Senate rooms at the U. S. Capitol and the dome of the Naval Academy.
