2022 Honoree Hans Steffen

Congratulations to our 239th honoree of the German Society's 'Distinguished Service Award', Hans Steffen.

Born, Hans Kurt Wilhelm Steffen in Karow, Hinter-Pommern (now part of Poland) on April 6, 1939 to Robert and Frieda Steffen, the middle child of three, joining brother Fritz and later sister Ilse. The family was forced to leave their home by the Russian army in 1946. The inhabitants of their small village knew they would have to relocate after being overrun by opposing forces in 1945. They packed their belongings and prepared for the move. They did not prepare for the edict that they leave in "10 minutes" taking NOTHING. They left with the clothes on their backs, no food, no money, and nothing to make a living. After a grueling trek to Segeberg, they were put on cattle cars and shipped to the western coast of Northern Germany, to the Isle of Sylt. For three years and 3 months they lived in 1 room at an ex-military base, with communal sanitary facilities and a mass kitchen operated by the German Red Cross. The times were tough and food scarce. Hans parents often walked to the bridge to the mainland to beg for food so that they could feed their family. In 1948, Hans' father, Robert was able to use a small patch of land north of the camp and here he grew enough potatoes to get them and some others in the area through their last winter before being relocated. In 1949, the family was moved to Schwabia and life in general improved. The German Red Cross provided 4 rooms for them on the 3rd floor of a private home in Pliezhausen; food was becoming more plentiful and his parents found jobs. Robert began working in the construction industry and Frieda in the knitting factory. The children returned to school and continued in trade schools. It was at this time that Hans became a retail sales manager trainee. At that time, the trade schools required 4 days of work and one day (paid) at a formal class associated with that trade.

In 1957, after several interviews with a representative of the American Red Cross and the sponsorship of Charles E. Miller, a Chevy dealer in Ellicott City, the entire Steffen family emigrated to a farm outside of Ellicott City. Mr. Miller was a public spirited man who donated the land for both the First Lutheran Church, as well as the Gray Rock Library, both in Ellicott City. He put Hans and his brother, Fritz, to work at the dealership. It was here they learned English. Hans became an apprentice Cabinetmaker.

Hans was drafted into the American Army in 1962. He served two years active duty, serving 12 months in South Korea in the Emergency Room of a MASH hospital. Then served 2 years as an active National Guardsman. Following his four years of service, he began his career as a NATO driver for the German Armed Forces Command USA/CA. Hans worked at Dulles Airport in Sterling in the motor pool, driving all types of motorized equipment as well as chauffeuring many types of personnel, from Ministers, Generals, Attaches, etc. Hans worked in this capacity from 1966 until his retirement in 2004.

It was in 1958, after settling into their new home and new life, that the family began searching for kindred spirits. They found this in the Baltimore Kickers (founded 1953). Both Hans and his brother Fritz were avid soccer players and joined immediately to play soccer and to socialize with fellow Germans. Unfortunately, living in Ellicott City and not having a vehicle prohibited the Steffens' from traveling to Baltimore for the many events. This changed when the family purchased a vehicle from Mr. Miller and they became fully immersed in Soccer. Hans played on

the 1st team for many years, Blobs' Park team and the Baltimore Kickers Oldtimer's Teams.

Hans met his wife, Maria Rute Dias, at a Kickers' dance in 1967 at the old Alcazar. They married on November 30, 1968. They have two daughters, Sonia, born in 1970 and Sandra, born in 1974. Hans and Maria are also the proud grandparents of Olivia (age 15) and Adam (age 13). Hans enjoys spending time with the children as evidenced by the photograph of Hans with Olivia's Kindergarten class. Hans presented the children with a little German culture and some tasty German culinary delights.

Hans has been an active supporter of the German-Maryland community for more than 64 years. Besides being a successful player and referee for the Baltimore Kickers he served in multiple positions including the Financial Secretary, Membership Chairman, Treasurer and as their President from 1983 to 1986. As the club' Cultural Chairman, a position he still holds, he was instrumental in organizing the German Language classes, served over 25 years arranging their overseas trips for members, and continues planning their cultural events, such as Schlachtfest, Schutzenfest, Crab and Shrimp feasts, etc. Hans is ever-present at the German Festival and if you have ever had Schnitzel at the festival, you have experienced some of Hans' best work.

Besides the Kickers, Hans is a member of Fidelitas and the Zion Church (serving on their Finance Committee). In addition, he was instrumental in initiating the partnership with Zion and providing us with their shared annual, and quite successful, Christkindlmarkt in the churches beautiful Adlersaal. He also served for many years on the Oktoberfest Committee and provided support to the community's legislative efforts to have October declared German American Heritage Month, which was successfully passed in 2013.

Besides being the German Society of Maryland's 239th honoree, Hans was awarded the 'Federal Republic of Germany Friendship' award by Gunther van Well, the German Ambassador in 1986, and an 'Honorary' membership by the Baltimore Kickers.

Hans has been a dedicated servant of the German Maryland community for many years and hopes that others will continue to strive for programs that will entice and sustain young people in our community. He urges strong leadership, vision, outreach, and growth to keep our heritage alive and well in the future.

In memory of

Theodore J. 'TED' Potthast, Jr.

Members of the German Society of Maryland will always remember Ted. To me Ted was an outstanding leader of our Society. Like no other did he direct and influence the affairs of the Society. He was a lifetime member, former president, treasurer and newsletter editor. He contributed with many articles, just as he wrote and edited his own family newsletter "which totaled 1200 editions during his lifetime" (daughter Marialena 'Mia' Walsh).

Even as treasurer Ted inspired and convinced members of the board to spend almost \$50,000.00 for the creation of a bronze statue of Brigadier General John Stricker (1759-1825), hero of the Battle of North Point, war of 1812, Vice President of the German Society of Maryland (1817-1825), now located on the grounds of Zion Church of the City of Baltimore. At a time when historic monuments are being removed due to the association of those representing the curse and shame of slavery, the German Society remembers General Stricker as one of her own, a prominent historic American statesman and citizen.

Ted had a strong love for history and was proud of his German heritage. He kept in touch with his family and relatives in Germany. His son Mark remembers the fun his father enjoyed when fishing rockfish with his cousins from Germany during the time when rockfish were considered an endangered species. Ted returning the small fish into the water again explained to his cousins: "In America we only take the big fish."

Ted had the gift of command and the patient power of persuasion. Exercising leadership in our Society is no small task since many of us do not hold back with our suggestions and opinions. Ted was a kind, considerate and generous leader – the creation of the statue of General Stricker will always be associated with Ted Potthast.

Frederick N. Rasmussen had a fine article about Ted in the Baltimore Sun - you can read the full version by googling "Obituary of Theodore Potthast by Fred Rasmussen on August 25. 2022"

I considered Ted a good and loyal friend. He was Roman Catholic, a strong believer who received weekly communion at home. The attendance at this funeral mass was an expression of the many people Ted touched. Ted for me represented the brain of the German Society as well as its heart in generous support for the outreach ministry of the Society, in support of students learning German and keeping in touch with people in need of emotional and personal support. In my own 36 years of association with the German Society Ted Potthast has been a most outstanding leader.
