# Family Fun at the 2024 Maryland German Festival

On July 13th and 14th the Maryland German Festival returned to the State Fairgrounds for a celebration of Maryland's German heritage. Over 2,300 people attended this year's festival, drinking about 37 kegs of beer!

The German Festival is sponsored by the Maryland Bürgerverein, an umbrella group for the state's German organizations. As a constituent member of this "club of clubs," the German Society of Maryland joined other member organizations in staging this popular Maryland event. The member organizations include the Kickers Soccer Club, Zion Church of the City of Baltimore, Germania Masonic Lodge, and the Arion Gesangverein.

Gus Nothdurft serves as president of the Bürgerverein and oversees the planning and execution of the festival.

#### The German Society's Role

The German Festival is an important means for the German Society to make ourselves known to the general public, advertise our mission to preserve Maryland's German heritage and traditions, and recruit new members. In addition to staffing our own cultural information booth, Society members assisted with the overall festival planning as members of the Festival Committee.

This year, our members took the lead in organizing the festival's online ticket sales, finding a new source for festival-branded beer pitchers, and coordinating the volunteers who checked the IDs at the front gate.

#### **Barrel March Reinvigorated**

The Barrel March has always been a popular feature of the festival. Since the barrel that had been used for many years was falling apart, a new barrel had to be procured.

Society President Steven Harper found a suitable replacement from a brewing supply store in Philadelphia. He delivered it to the woodworking shop of Bob Hunt, president of Germania Masonic Lodge. Bob sanded, stained, and varnished the new barrel. He also equipped it with a new saddle to ensure the safety of the rider.

Bill Kommalan, First Vice President of the German Society, took charge of finding children brave enough to ride the barrel. Dressed in his lederhosen and waving his beer mug, Bill led the parade through the festival hall several times each day.

This year, the Barrel March was accompanied by live music from the Edelweiss Band. This was made possible by the efforts of the festival's entertainment chair, Jenn Thomas, who planned the daily schedule.

# High School German Summer Study Scholarship

For recent years the German Society has offered a scholarship to a Maryland high school student to participate in a summer study program in Germany. The program is conducted by the American Association of Teachers of German (AATG) and an agency of the German government, Pedagogical Exchange Service. Participants in the program live with a family for 3 weeks, attend a German high school, and travel with other participants to nearby cities.

### Small & Large Gifts Support the Scholarship

In 2024, the summer study scholarship was funded directly from the Society's Education Fund. This was made possible by many small gifts from Society members, as well as a gift of \$1,000 from the Mary Jean and Oliver Travers Foundation.

In early 2024, the German Society received a generous gift of \$10,000 from the Edelweiss Club with the stipulation that the money be used for the high school summer study program. This gift will provide funding for the scholarship for the next two years.

#### The 2024 Recipient

The winner of the 2024 Summer Study Program Scholarship was Charlie Schmidt, a homeschooled student from Catonsville, MD. Last July Charlie spent 3 weeks in Öhringen (Baden-Württemberg) living with a host family. Along with the other American students participating in the program, Charlie also traveled to Nuremberg.

Charlie will have a display of photographs from his travels at the Anniversary Dinner on November 2nd. During the initial reception, members will have the opportunity to talk with Charlie about his experience.

# German for Beer Festivals

Get ready for your next German beer festival by learning basic conversational German along with some German drinking songs.

That is the idea behind *German for Beer Festivals*, a joint undertaking of the German Society, the Arion Gesangverein and the Rathskeller Restaurant in Elkridge.

Members of the Society and Arion will pair simple conversational German with the singing of the bestknown German drinking songs. Participation is free.

The Arion Gesangverein is Baltimore's last German singing society, with a history of over 170 years. In tandem with other German singing societies, Arion performed at the dedication of the Gettysburg cemetery and won honors in numerous national and regional competitions.

At 5:00 pm on November 9th, the German Society will co-sponsor the annual St. Martin's Day Lantern Procession at the German Language School (GLS) at the Zion Church of Baltimore. The GLS has celebrated this popular German children's holiday for nearly 15 years.

This free activity has always been open to all interested families, and the German Society hopes that its cosponsorship will provide stronger financial stability for the event and help attract even wider participation.

The event includes a mass re-enactment of the story of St. Martin, a procession with songs and lanterns around Baltimore's City Hall Plaza, and refreshments.

# Schifferstadt Architectural Museum

Members and friends of the German Society of Maryland enjoyed a private tour of the Schifferstadt Architectural Museum on September 28 in Frederick.

Schifferstadt was the family homestead of the German immigrant family of Joseph and Cathrine Brunner, who arrived in Frederick County in 1736. They named

their new farm after their hometown in Germany. The surviving stone farmhouse was constructed in 1758.

Schifferstadt is one of the oldest surviving homes in Frederick County and is a unique example of how German immigrants adapted to life in their new homeland.
